These transitions reflect our commitment to developing leaders and ensuring continuity for clients.

Client results that matter

Across the firm in 2025, our lawyers delivered results that solved problems and moved businesses forward, while earning recognition for legal excellence from Chambers USA, The Legal 500, Best Law Firms, Best Lawyers, and many other organizations. Our litigators tried seven cases across four states—California, Florida, Ohio, and Texas—securing decisive jury verdicts on both the defense and plaintiff sides, while our appellate lawyers argued seven appeals nationwide and earned multiple victories, including three published decisions.

We saw continued momentum in intellectual property. Our IP team supported 1,400+ patent filings and 830+ trademark applications, resulting in 1,000+ issued patents and 640 registered trademarks, reflecting sustained demand across innovation-driven industries.

On the transactional side, we executed several significant deals, including Enovis’s \$60 million sale of its Dr. Comfort business to Promus Equity Partners and the recapitalization of System Seals by Vance Street Capital. The latter earned Peter Rome, Dan Schiau, and Ryan Kray *The*

Meanwhile, our finance and real estate teams completed more than 125 transactions with an aggregate value exceeding \$9.8 billion, reinforcing the firm’s position as a go-to advisor on complex financings and real estate deals nationwide.

Investing in people, technology, and security

We continued to invest in our people through strategic expansion, mentorship, and professional development. Through our annual in-house programs—including Trial Academy, Litigation Institute, IP Summit, and Junior Attorney Corps—we maintained our commitment to developing the next generation of Tucker Ellis lawyers.

We also invested in infrastructure that enhances quality, predictability, and value. In 2025, we adopted advanced legal AI technology across the firm, integrating it thoughtfully to enhance productivity and legal analysis while maintaining rigorous oversight and strong information-governance controls. These investments reflect the expectations of our sophisticated clients and the regulatory standards of the industries they serve.

Together, these efforts underscore our commitment to a future defined by deliberate innovation, continuous talent development, and disciplined, trusted client service.

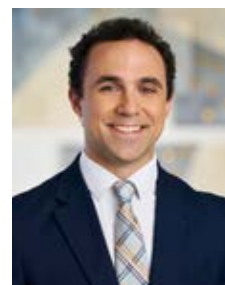

Elevating Legal Excellence

Advancing our in-house programs

In 2025, Tucker Ellis continued its commitment to developing exceptional lawyers through robust, high-impact in-house programs. Designed to support attorneys at every stage of their careers, these initiatives emphasized practical skill development, collaboration across practices and offices, and meaningful engagement with firm and client leadership.

IP Summit

In August, the firm's annual IP Summit convened intellectual property attorneys from across the country for a full day of knowledge-sharing and professional development. The program focused on emerging legal trends, recent case law, and evolving prosecution and litigation strategies, enabling attendees to deepen their technical expertise while strengthening cross-office collaboration in support of innovative client solutions.

Litigation Institute

Our 2025 Litigation Institute built on its strong foundation with two immersive sessions in September and October that brought together associates and experienced faculty for advanced advocacy training. Participants engaged in hands-on workshops, strategy discussions, and mentorship opportunities focused on trial readiness and client representation. The program continues to play a critical role in preparing the firm's next generation of trial lawyers to meet the increasingly complex demands of modern litigation.

Trial Academy

Following preparatory CLE sessions, participants in our 2025 Trial Academy stepped into first-chair roles during a full-scale mock trial based on a complex products liability matter, navigating everything from pretrial motions to jury instructions. The experience demanded quick decision-making, teamwork, and command of courtroom procedure—skills essential to confident trial leadership.

In-House Counsel Summit

Marking its 12th year in 2025, our In-House Counsel Summit remains a signature program connecting Tucker Ellis attorneys with corporate legal leaders. The in-person program, hosted in Cleveland, featured a slate of engaging CLE sessions examining current legal, ethical, and business challenges, including intellectual property enforcement, labor-trafficking risk, evolving ethics standards, compliance governance, and key developments from the Supreme Court's 2024–25 term. The series concluded with four additional virtual sessions held through December, extending the conversation and providing continued access to timely insights for in-house counsel nationwide.

Excellence in the Courtroom

2025 trial and appellate highlights

In 2025, our attorneys secured decisive courtroom and appellate victories, including defense verdicts in high-exposure trials, multimillion-dollar plaintiff recoveries, and published appellate decisions shaping business, product liability, copyright, insurance, and trade secret law.

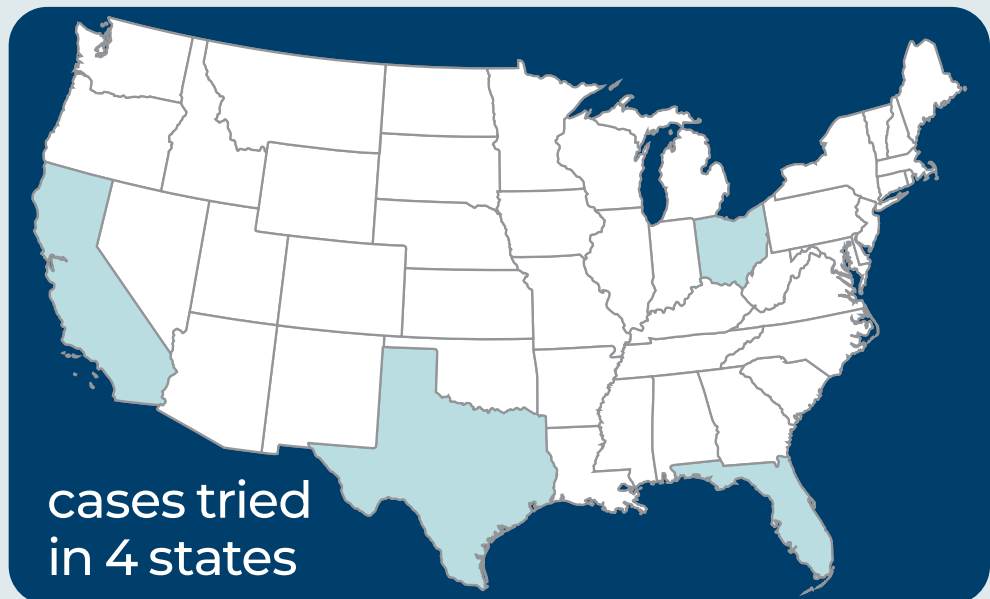

Major defense verdicts and trial wins

Throughout the year, our trial attorneys achieved multiple complete and defense-leaning jury verdicts in high-stakes matters. In Los Angeles, we secured a full defense verdict for BMW in a crashworthiness trial involving more than \$100 million in claimed damages, with jurors finding the vehicle's structure and restraint systems were not defective. We also obtained a unanimous defense verdict in an informed-consent medical negligence trial, rejecting claims of permanent nerve injury. In Texas, a jury returned a complete defense verdict in a five-vehicle highway accident case seeking \$8.9 million after agreeing with the defense position that a different driver caused the collision. In an Ohio medical negligence and wrongful death trial, jurors rejected the wrongful death claim and allocated only minimal liability, substantially limiting exposure.



Plaintiff-side trial victory and major judgment

In a three-week Orange County jury trial involving the theft of our client's business interests, our Orange County-based trial lawyers obtained a judgment exceeding \$30 million.

Appellate and landmark wins

Our attorneys secured significant appellate victories shaping legal precedent. For our client Boehringer Ingelheim, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit affirmed summary judgment and a \$1.7 million attorneys' fee award in a long-running copyright dispute and upheld approval of a contested bankruptcy settlement. Additionally, the Sixth Circuit affirmed denial of more than \$1 million in sanctions in a complex trade secret matter. In California, appellate courts issued decisions limiting fee-shifting in commercial lease disputes and enforcing mandatory statutory buyouts in limited partnership dissolution cases.



Making a Difference Through Pro Bono Service

2025 pro bono highlights

At Tucker Ellis, our commitment to pro bono service remains central to who we are and how we practice law. In 2025, attorneys from every Hallway devoted their time and talent to expanding access to justice—partnering with nonprofit organizations, representing vulnerable clients, and advancing thoughtful dialogue around pro bono leadership and impact.

U.S. Supreme Court advocacy

Led by Chad Eggspuehler, Tucker Ellis and co-counsel Advocates 4 Trans Equality filed an amicus brief in *Hecox and BPJ*, challenging bans on transgender athletes and presenting

a historically grounded analysis of discrimination, supported by legal historians nationwide. Extensive support came from Ben Crawford, Danielle Easton, Ben Eldredge, Taylor Gill, and Jessica Toncler.

Civil rights and Section 1983 representation

Diana Gerstel and Cheska Tolentino in the District of New Jersey and Max Huber in the Eastern District of Illinois continued court-appointed representations of incarcerated clients alleging constitutional violations. Diana and Cheska's case claiming a correctional facility's failure to mitigate COVID-19 risks is ongoing,

while Max's case concluded in a settlement that provided meaningful closure.

Tenant and housing advocacy

Representation by Danielle Easton and Spencer Krebs in a landlord-tenant dispute utilized strategic motion practice and led to a favorable settlement.













Nonprofit and employment counseling

Christine Snyder provided ongoing pro bono employment counseling to the Cleveland Animal Protective League and the Center for Arts Inspired Learning, while Anna-Sophie Tirre advised Harvest Home, a nonprofit serving unhoused expectant mothers in Los Angeles, on immigration considerations for hiring a non-citizen social worker.

Patent pro bono work

Through the Ohio Patent Pro Bono Program, Francesca LaMontagne and Patrick Clunk guided a solo inventor through the beginning stages of USPTO examination of an innovative shoe design.

Opening doors to the profession

In 2025, Tucker Ellis continued to invest in the future of the legal profession by creating meaningful points of access for students at multiple stages of their educational journeys. Our Pipeline Program emphasizes early exposure, practical experience, and sustained mentorship to help students better understand both the study and practice of law.

Throughout the year, attorneys volunteered with Junior Achievement of Greater Cleveland, supported students through the 3Rs program, hosted participants in the Saint Martin de Porres High School Work-Study Program, and welcomed a Louis Stokes Scholars Program intern through the Cleveland Metropolitan Bar Association. We also remained actively engaged in inclusion-forward recruitment and law school outreach

through the LCLD 1L Scholars Program, Norman S. Minor Bar Association (NSMBA) Law Student Summits, scholarships, sponsorships, and moot court coaching.

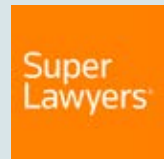

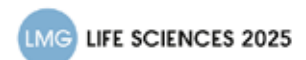
